3. When the Girl Scouts saluted the flag, what did they do differently than girls do today?
4. What did you notice about the uniforms they wore at camp?
5. How did the girls carry their bedrolls?
6. What is a Scout Pace?
7. What kinds of communication did Margaret use?
8. What was considered “housework”?
9. At the end of the movie what is the name of the award that was presented to the Girl Scout?
10. Do you know who presented the award to Margaret Ferris at the end of the movie?

# **“The Golden Eaglet” Video Discussion Questions**

## **ANSWER KEY**

1. It is a silent movie in black and white. The only sound is a piano playing along with the movie.
2. They washed up and did calisthenics (exercises) before breakfast.
3. When the girls said the words “to the flag” they pointed to the flag.
4. The Captains (leaders) and Lieutenants (assistant leaders) wore dresses. The girls wore dresses or knickers. They all wore hats.
5. The blankets were tied in a roll that was worn diagonally over their shoulder.
6. It is ten steps running, followed by ten steps walking.
7. Margaret used semaphore and Morse code.
8. Housework is helping to clean and pick up around the house and out in the yard, just like children do their chores today.
9. The Golden Eaglet was the award that was presented. It was the highest Award in Girl Scouting at that time.
10. Juliette Gordon Low, our founder, presented the award.
